## Spring Tournament

### Hosted by Seikikai Karate Club

**Spring tournament at the Etobicoke Olympium on Saturday, April 27<sup>th</sup>.** Registration is **on-line only** and **closes April 25<sup>th</sup>**.

An advantage to registering early is that for Kumite (free sparring) we sometimes have to award a “bye” (the transfer of a competitor directly to the next round of the competition) to some competitors at the start of the competition, in order to get the group to a size where we can have a set of straight elimination rounds. If you get a “bye” it’s like winning your first sparring match without sparring. If needed, “bys” will be awarded to the competitors registered in the group in the order of when they registered.

In order to compete, participants are required to wear a karate gi (uniform). These are available through our club. Another requirement for new students is that competitors must be able to get through one of their Kihon Kata as a minimum. For Kumite (free sparring) no jewelry (bracelets, rings, watches, dangling earrings, Kara, etc.) are allowed. This is a safety issue. If participants are wearing jewelry and do not remove it, they will not be allowed in the Kumite portion of the tournament.

The tournament will be from **2:00 pm to 4:30 pm**. Pizza will be available afterwards.

**We always need judges.** There is a section in the registration on-line for judges to register as well. Judges, please arrive at 1:30 for a Judges meeting prior to the tournament.

Registration information was sent out to the Yudansha membership by separate email. Please talk to your sensei if you have not received the information.

## Annual Training Camp

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## FIVE DECADES OF THE TORONTO WADO-KAI ARE RECOGNISED

On Saturday, March 2, 2024, 54 current and past members of our organisation came together to enjoy an evening of comradeship, good food and spirits, and were entertained with the presentations of well-deserved awards, speeches, and shared memories. Slide shows for past (and present) karate-ka at events and dojos played throughout the evening.

As mentioned in this issue, four senior ranked sensei were recognised for their long service to the organisation over the past five decades. Sensei Dave Manara also mentioned other sensei that are in their fourth and third decades with the organisation and thanked everyone for their continued and valued support.

Before Sensei Manara was called up to the podium to make his presentations, Sensei Steve Borda surprised him, announcing that, on behalf of the senior ranks, he was presenting Sensei with a 60<sup>th</sup> Year Appreciation Award to recognise his years training in the martial arts, as well as the over five decades of leadership with the organisation.

After Sensei Manara made his presentations, Sensei Borda once again arose to the podium to make a special presentation to Sensei Manara of his rank to 10<sup>th</sup> Dan, Judan. This rank is presented by the senior ranks of an organisation; it is not awarded by Sensei himself. His senior belts believed it was time Sensei was recognised. The Federation of All Japan Karate-do Organizations no longer exists, but it had published the criteria for this rank in 1971. The requirements include that the incumbent has held the rank of Kudan (9<sup>th</sup> Dan) for over 10 years and is over 70 years of age. This is in recognition of the many years of experience and sage leadership at such a senior level.

In a note to the Yudansha, Sensei Borda commented, "Sensei Manara has been our Sensei, mentor, and friend over the years. His leadership has kept us all together and progressing. This recognition is well deserved, and I was glad to be a part of it. Congratulations to Sensei Manara for all his efforts."

Special guests included Brenda and John Paul. Brenda was one of Sensei's first students at Ryerson. In good-hearted jest, Brenda's nickname was Ma Parker (Parker being her maiden name), rhyming with the infamous 'Ma Barker'.

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## Many Memories – Great Experiences!

We thought we'd share some memories of alumni of the organisation from many years ago.

### ALUMNUS – SENSEI JOE CERILLI, YODAN

I joined the Toronto Wado-Kai karate club in 1985 and, although I've given up regular training for the last ten years or so, I've continued practicing my katas at home, in the park, and any other locations large enough to practice my (now slow motion) moves.

Shortly after my family moved to Thornhill, I joined the Thornhill club. I met Wolfgang Franke, the head of the club at that time and my first instructor. I learned that the club was started at Ryerson University by Sensei Dave Manara, senior instructor of the TWKK.

The name, Dave Manara, sounded familiar. When I found out that he worked at Motorola at the time, I realized that after I graduated from Ryerson, Dave had interviewed me for a job at Motorola. As it turned out, he offered me the job, but I had decided to accept a CBC job offer instead.

When I was introduced to Dave, I asked him if he recalled our interview. Yes, he did remember me – apparently, I was the only one to have turned down his job offer.

I continued to train, learn and participate in black belt classes and TWKK tournaments. I met and developed friendships with students and instructors from other clubs. One of those people was Ray Kennedy, a visiting instructor at our club. His approach to teaching gave me confidence that I was capable of advancing.

My daughter Sara, who didn't want to be left behind by her brother, joined when she was six, got her junior black belt, and became an avid physical exercise advocate.

The learning experience; the camaraderie within our club as well as with the other clubs; the tournaments; the annual summer camps at Wasaga Beach; and the friendships among our children became part of our family life.

Currently, my wife and I are retired and live in Victoria, B.C., so we can be close to our grandchildren. I golf all year around and practice yoga to keep me in shape for my golf.



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## ALUMNUS – SENSEI JOEL COHEN, GODAN

Well, I can start off by saying my journey took me to the TMU (Ryerson) karate club back in 1979 where I met Sensei Dave Manara. 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**FROM THE EDITOR:**

**Email Purge:** I did my best to contact people who have been on my email mailing lists for many years. When I send out notices or each issue of FOCUS, I do not receive (nor expect to) any indication if people receive the emails, or even if the email addresses are still active. Over the past few months, I have tried contacting people on my list. The people who responded are now the only ones on my current lists. Those that did not respond or asked to be removed, have been removed from my distribution lists. If you are reading FOCUS and wish to receive a reminder when it comes out, email your address to me. Everyone can access information on the TWKK website, of course.

**Delete the Email:** Please remove TWKK@psstnetwork.ca or rdods@psstnetwork.ca from your email address book if you have it saved. The email to use is TorontoWadoKai@gmail.com. (I cancelled the psstnetwork domain).

**July Issue Might be Delayed:** I'm just giving advanced warning that the July issue of FOCUS might be a bit delayed this summer. Monica and I will be on vacation for about four weeks from the last week in June. If I get bored on the trip (unlikely) I may be able to put the issue together while I am away, but it will more likely not be until I return. I will send out an expected submission date to the Club Heads in June that will likely give more time for you to put something together for that issue.

**Pass it Along:** As noted above, the only people who receive a notice that an issue of FOCUS is ready are those on my distribution lists. These lists include only black belt ranks and alumni who have asked to be on the list. Because kyu belt karate-ka may come and go, I do not ask for or keep kyu belt emails. I ask that the Yudansha members (the black belts), Club Heads, and Communication Officers pass along reminders to the karate-ka of your dojos each time an issue of FOCUS comes out. This will help with our continued communication efforts. Thanks for your help!

**TITLES AND NAMES IN TWKK**

It's a small thing, but consistency helps when using titles and names in writing articles for FOCUS, which is often used as a reference for examples. Occasionally, I bring up reminders in the use of terminology. I found a typo on last quarter's issue of FOCUS, and I thought it was a good time to mention the correct spelling for some terms we use.

**Karate-ka or Karateka?** The term for a student of karate is '**karate-ka**'. You will find it written sometimes without the hyphen, but in the Toronto Wado-Kai literature we use the hyphen. It might be capitalised when being emphasised, but it usually isn't.

**What is the difference between Sensei and sensei?** Capitalised, it is the formal address for an instructor, like using Dr (doctor) before a name. With the lower case, sensei means instructor in general; and both can mean singular or plural. Some examples are, 'He is the sensei of that dojo'; 'All the sensei of the clubs got together'; 'Sensei Manara visited our dojo'; 'Sensei Steve and Ray also visited'.

While we do sometimes use the term Sensei in front of each name in a list, it is not necessary, but we might do this as a form of respect, or when there may be someone in the list that is not a sensei. An example of this would be 'Sensei Dave, Sensei Steve, Sensei Ray, and John Smith attended.' Since the plural of Sensei and sensei is spelled the same way (we do not add an 's' – i.e., senseis), listing each honorific may help the reader distinguish who is a sensei and who is not in a list a people.

**How about Wado-Kai?** The name Wado-Kai can be seen with or without the hyphen, but in the Toronto Wado-Kai Karate Club Ltd. organisation, the hyphen is used.

**What is the Senior Dan Council?** Active ranks of Yodan (4<sup>th</sup> Dans) and higher are members of the Senior Dan Council, which represents the senior ranks of the organisation. While Sensei Manara more regularly confers with those named as directors of the organisation, there are times he would like the opinions of the senior ranks and will look to the Council for input. While there are members of the Council you may not see training, they are likely actively providing support to the organisation in other ways. Last year the list of Council members was reduced because there were names of members who have been retired and inactive with the organisation for a while.

If you have any questions about terminology used in our organisation, please forward your requests to me. We can all benefit from the answer to a question. >Editor Robb Dods

The Club Heads will share their experiences and expertise in running clubs with each other and can help new startups with practical advice.

A karate club is an uncomplicated business. Most instructors rent space by time, out of public locations like churches, community centres, schools, and the like, so the rental overhead is low compared to renting a location full-time.

The TWKK clubs may not be quite a turn-key operation, but it comes close in that the knowledge and experience of running a club is readily available from others.

If you think you have what it takes to run a small business or become a Club Head, then contact Sensei Manara. The lesson I learned early about business finances is that it wasn't as much about what I made, as it was about what I could keep in managing a home-based business while still working in my profession. > Sensei Robb Dods
