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Winter Tournament at the Etobicoke Olympium

Saturday, January 25

Registration is on-line only and closes January 23rd.

An advantage to registering early is that for Kumite (free sparring) we sometimes have to award a "bye" (the transfer of a competitor directly to the next round of the competition) to some competitors at the start of the competition, in order to get the group to a size where we can have a set of straight elimination rounds. If you get a "bye" it's like winning your first sparring match without sparring. If needed, byes will be awarded to the competitors registered in the group in the order of when they registered.

In order to compete, participants are required to wear a karate gi (uniform). These are available through your instructor.

Another requirement for new students, is that competitors must be able to get through one of their Kihon Kata as a minimum.

For Kumite (free sparring) no jewelry (bracelets, rings, watches, dangling earrings, Kara, etc.) are allowed. This is a safety issue. If participants are wearing jewelry and do not remove it, they will not be allowed in the Kumite portion of the tournament.

The tournament will be from 2:00 pm to 4:30 pm. Pizza will be available afterwards.

We always need judges. There is a section in the registration on-line for judges to register as well. Judges, please arrive at 1:30 for a Judges meeting prior to the tournament.



Many Memories – Great Experiences!

More shared memories from another alumnus of the organisation who trained at Ryerson in years past.

Sensei Robb Dods, Rokudan

I apologise up front for any repeat of things I have shared in past issues. Here are a few of my stories from the early years.



Before I started my karate training, I was in my first year at Ryerson and there were flyers up on the walls advertising the karate classes. I was living at Neill-Wycik College, and a friend of mine had started taking the classes. A girl he was dating got the nickname 'Flipper' because she was taking classes too and someone was kidding her about how he could 'take her on' even if she was taking karate. Fooling around, she had flipped him over her shoulder (nothing to do with her training), hence the nickname. Well, I got the idea that maybe I would like to try karate, so I joined the Beginners class in February 1974.

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In the beginning, karate was a mystifying thing, something I had only seen in the movies and knew nothing about. Those beginner classes opened my eyes to the fact that karate was just disciplined training and a lot of repetition (did I say a lot?). I had not been one for sports in high school, but I really enjoyed the classes, the workouts and the friendships that were developing. Working out in a class where I could focus on myself, yet take part in a bigger, whole experience was unique for me.

The first Training Camp happened that summer. It was a totally different experience working out on grass (rather bumpy ground underfoot, actually) and a lot of fun. I hadn't brought a tent, there was no room in the cottage, so I slept

in my car. There I met the sister of my friend I mentioned earlier. She was taking classes in Port Perry, and it was her sensei's family that owned the cottage we were staying at (this was a sensei from another style that didn't have an organisation to support him, and Sensei Dave asked him to join our organisation). I had the nerve to ask her to go for a beer and banana split in Uxbridge on the Sunday before we all went home. (Beer and a banana split? What was I thinking?)



In the early days of training, your sensei is a large figure in the scheme of things. Sensei Dave may have been just a few years older than me, but he presented a master presence in those classes. I used to get a hurting twinge in my back sometimes when we did some types of exercises, and I remember when I was a yellow belt Sensei coming over while I was nursing my lower back, and he started rubbing it with his fist in a massage sort of way to help loosen the muscles that had seized up. I was impressed; the Master had just done a very personal thing for me that seemed above and beyond in a class.



Sensei would travel up to Port Perry so he could teach the sensei there our Wado-Kai katas. When I got my green belt I, along with another karate-ka, would go up to meet Sensei, where he worked at Motorola in North York, after our school classes were done and accompany him on the ride up to Port Perry. There were times just Sensei and I would go up. We both have the memory of coming home in a snowstorm, the night so black and the blinding snow so thick that we could not see where the sides of the road were. The headlights just shone on a wall of huge snowflakes dropping before us. Sensei was tense with the driving, and I was tense trying to tell him if he was too close to the ditch, which we couldn't make out.

In those early days, we went to invitational open tournaments where we competed against a range of styles and other schools of training. In my first

real competition as a green belt, I wasn't doing too badly. Then I was up against a big guy who didn't like that I scored a point on him. I came out a winner of the match by disqualification with knuckle imprints on my forehead and had the nickname, at least for the rest of the day, of 'Lumpy'.

My worst memory is of a class we were doing line attack. A fellow green belt, Sandy, was quite aggressive and would stand up to the guys no matter what, a real joy to spar with. I was at the front facing my line and Sandy charged in. I put out my fist and she ran straight into it. The next class I brought her flowers to apologise for breaking her nose. She forgave me from the start, we both knew what had happened, but I still feel bad to this day thinking about it.

Once I achieved my blue belt in 1975, life got in the way, slowing down my training. I had a part time job, school was busy, I had to work in the summers such that I could rarely get into Toronto for the classes, and I got married in my last year in college, all of which meant my focus was not on my training. I had my blue belt for about six years by the time my life settled down after I graduated and got a job in my profession. I didn't get to any of the early training camps that were held at the Ryerson farm out near Pontypool.



I kept going back to classes when I could, and I attended the training camps at Rice Lake and the Ryerson Chalet at Blue Mountain, before the Wasaga Beach days. I went back to training with passion in 1982 and achieved my Shodan by early 1984. During this time, I started up the Port Perry club again, which had not been operating for many years.
